Sunday, February 12: Richard Whiteley

Jurors accept pieces into the Exhibition by category and ensure balance and diversity across the Exhibition. The categories are jewelry (all media categories) and non-jewelry entries by media categories of book arts, ceramics, enamel, fiber, glass, metal, mixed media, and wood. Awards are given by the CCC and sponsoring guilds. All artists living, working and/or attending college in Virginia, Maryland, or DC or who are members of sponsoring guilds may apply. All work must be for sale. Artists may submit as many as 4 pieces total; the media of the 4 pieces may vary. All work must have been produced after January 1, 2019 and not previously
